Winds Rattle Ghost Town

The Davis Western (Ghost) Town got walloped by Santa Ana winds pummeling LA County Wednesday and Thursday, March 13 to 14.

By Thursday morning, several storefronts had broken free of their frames and staggered toward the tracks at various angles. But the two-story LD Saloon had held on.

However at 9:45 am a powerful wind gust tore through the Club like a runaway locomotive. It was so strong that the trees along Crystal Springs Drive bent like palm trees in a hurricane. The saloon ripped out of its moorings and crashed facedown across the tracks.



Damage Assessed and Repaired

Lloyd Davis, the Western Town builder, was called away from work to assess the situation. It appeared that the saloon structure itself was fairly intact, even though the second story deck and other building pieces were scattered on all sides.

He and Roger Williams, using the Gradall and a strap, pulled the saloon gently back in place and reset it on its mooring. Lloyd and son Andrew also pulled the Assay Office fascia off the tracks, and Lloyd came back Friday to continue repairs.

He was joined by Les Kovacs, Lisa Lipton, Don Kallgren, Gabriel and Ethan Perez, and other members, and the most serious damage to the Town was reme-

The March 4, 2024 Board Meeting was called to order by Vice-President Michael Murphy at 7:02 pm. It was a Zoom only meeting

with 25 participants. Seven (7) Directors were present. Michael Murphy hosted the meeting in Roger William's absence.

Secretary's Report: A party request was approved: Steve Rodstein, a private party Saturday, April 6 from 10 am to 1 pm. An FCR was submitted by Ross Harper and Les Kovacs with a proposed plan for the Pit. The Board will review and discuss in private session.

Treasurer's Report: Jim Cammarata presented the finance report, which was approved. We've been closed five public run days for rain from December through February, but revenue will pick up once the rain stops. Other recent expenses were for new work car brakes and a deposit for our new Club locomotive. The donation from the Netflix project will help offset these costs.

Membership Report: Jim Cammarata reported that 63 membership renewals are still unpaid as of March 4. The final deadline for renewals is March 15. On March 16, do we change these members' status to "past members"? A reinstatement fee of \$100 may be assessed for dropped resident members, according to the Club bylaws, plus their past dues and late fees. We need a mechanism that motivates members to pay their dues. The Board will discuss this in executive session. Some members have asked about paper invoices. These take much time and labor for which we have no personnel.

Superintendent's Report: Glen Manchester reminded us that March 9 is our usual workday, and on March 16 we're having a special workday. We're renting a 40-foot rolloff dumpster to span the second workday weekend. This Saturday we can clean up the facility and stage the debris, then load it into the rolloff next Saturday. Heavy Wind Required Much Cleanup

The week before the shoot, we had a heavy wind event. It toppled the Western Town Saloon and other storefronts onto the track, uprooted two sumac trees at Davis Mine, and blew small branches all over the railroad.

Gradall that afternoon. The same day Bill Schirmer and Glen Manchester filled the rented 40' rolloff with the accumulated leaves on Crystal Springs Drive before they blew away.

A full crew of volunteers came out during the special work Saturday and deep-cleaned the railroad, including the West End, and made repairs to the Western Town. The other uprooted sumac was cut down Monday by Ron Nelson and Roderick and Tristan Fritz and put in the rolloff.

On Sunday, many members commented on how well manicured the Club looked. Later on Sunday, the Y Switch leading into the Station failed and had to be spiked. Tuesday afternoon Ryan Pedersen, Ron Nelson, Tim Silver, Michael Strawn and Miles Kristman, with John DePhillip assisting by phone, had the switch back in service..

> Sumacs Dangle Across Davis Mine

Winds also buffeted Davis Mine on Thursday morning. Although the Mine itself remained intact, two 20-foot tall sumac tree-shrubs were blown to perilous angles across the exit and entrance of the Mine. The Board determined the trees should be removed in the interest of safety. Lisa Lipton and Les Kovacs took out one on Saturday, March 16, and on Monday Ron Nelson cut down the other with Roderick and Tristan Fritz. The remnants of both were loaded into the rented rolloff. Public trains were rerouted to avoid this area on Sunday.

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Ground Squirrels Tunnel Under Tracks at Minden

On Sunday, March 17 Ron Nelson discovered a ground squirrel hole that was affecting the tracks near Minden. He started to collapse the hole and fill it in, but found instead a large tunnel system that was very wide and quite deep: his shovel handle sank in 2-3 feet. The rest of the fill-in was completed on Tuesday by Ross Harper, Michael Strawn and Ryan Pedersen.

► The burrowing systems of California ground squirrels can range from five to 30 feet. Most tunnels lie within two to three feet of the surface. There can be a single tunnel or a series of complex branching systems. Because they are social animals, each system may be occupied by many squirrels. – excerpt from contracosta.gov.ca
